Multilingual Recognition Seal

Seniors graduating from high schools in the Ventura Unified School District may earn a Multilingual Recognition Seal on their diploma honoring their proficiency in more than one language.

To qualify for this recognition students must meet the following criteria:

- Score “proficient” or “advanced” on the 11th grade California Standards Test in English Language Arts.
- Complete all graduation requirements.
- Demonstrate proficiency in a language or languages other than English, including American Sign Language, by meeting at least one of the following requirements:
 1. Complete four years of instruction in the same Foreign Language with a grade of “B” or higher in the fourth year,
 2. Complete the fourth year course of a Foreign Language with a grade of “B” or higher,
 3. Pass an Advanced Placement (AP) Foreign Language Test with a score of “3” or higher, or
 4. Pass a District Foreign Language Test.
- In addition, English Learner students must earn a score at the overall Early Advanced or Advanced level on the (CELDT) California English Language Development Test.
